To The Woodhall School Community:

## "To learn something new, take the same path that you took yesterday." - John Burroughs

I shared this quotation with the boys recently in Morning Meeting, just as we reached the midpoint of the school year and the winter doldrums had decidedly taken hold. In some ways, I'm grateful for the same old, same old and find assurance in the predictability of our schedule after three years of pandemic-related disruptions.

While there is much that is novel this school year - the dynamic STEM Lab and its related programming and opportunities, the striking pavilion as a new gathering place on campus, and the relationships and energy of new students and adult mentors.
